Wednesday, Feb 20 th	Secret lives of the Canada Jay
7 pm Parry Sound Museum	Every year, researchers at Algonquin Park monitor breeding pairs of Canada Jays. This 55-year study is one of the longest of its kind in the world. Join researchers Alex Sutton and Koley Freeman, PhD candidates at the University of Guelph, to learn more about the world of the Canada Jay. They'll take you through the lives of these intelligent birds from egg to adulthood and include some exciting findings that radio telemetry has been able to provide.
Wednesday, March 20th	Gliders in the night
7 pm Parry Sound Museum	Sasha Newar, a graduate student at Trent University, will be presenting on Ontario's own superheroes: the flying squirrels. Join us to learn about northern and southern flying squirrels, the silent gliders of the night, and how modern bat recording software may help us finally see a clear picture of their world.
Wednesday, April 17 th	Biodiversity primer, what is it anyway?
7 pm Parry Sound Museum	James Kamesta (Environmental Consultant) will discuss the concept of biodiversity, what does it mean, the different levels of biodiversity, why is it important and what is happening with it.
Wednesday, May 15 th	Travels tales from Borneo
7 pm Parry Sound Museum	Fran Stewart will share her experiences on her trip to Borneo, a unique island of immense plant diversity, giant flying squirrels, monkeys with very big noses, Pygmy elephants, close encounters with Orangutangs and much more.

7 pm Parry Sound Museum	Anne Bell, Director of Conservation and Education at Ontario Nature will explain how Ontario Nature is working to ensure that Ontario meets its commitment to protect at least 17% of our lands and waters by 2020.
Wednesday, Sept 18th	Studying nightjars on Georgian Bay
7 pm Parry Sound Museum	Elora Grahame, a Ph.D. student at the University of Guelph, is currently studying the reproductive success of Common Nighthawks and Eastern Whip-poor-wills in hopes of uncovering factors contributing to their long-term declines. She will discuss the findings of her nightjar study and share tales of nocturnal fieldwork.
Wednesday, Oct 16th	Skinks, slave-makers, and sundews
7 pm Parry Sound Museum	The vast landscape of Queen Elizabeth II Wildlands Provincial Park fuels a rich diversity of northern and southern wildlife. From the comfort of our seats, Phil Careless (Ecologist, Ontario Parks) will have us exploring rock barrens and slogging through beaver bogs in pursuit of the strange life that grows, creeps, crawls, flies, bounds, and swims through this southern wilderness.

7 pm Parry Sound Museum	Legendary Algonquin naturalist Dan Strickland will explain what originally prevented, and what later permitted, the great northern expansion of White-tailed Deer.
